1. BASIC INFORMATION

Flight Times:

Arrival Airport: Managua, Nicaragua

Arrival Time: Missionaries must arrive to Managua before 4:00pm on the arrival day. Chinandega
is over two hours away from the airport. Early arrivals will be required to wait in the
airport until all participants have arrived.

- Departure Time: Missionaries must depart Managua on the day of departure in the early afternoon.
- It is not possible for missionaries to arrive or leave on dates or at times different than the group.

Where we serve:

Mission Youth offers young people the chance to serve in Nicaragua in a community with various humanitarian and spiritual needs including an orphanage for boys and an orphanage for girls, home for the physically handicapped, construction projects for schools and parishes, and home visits to bring food and the Blessed Sacrament.

Typical mission day includes:

- Morning: Prayers, breakfast and construction project / humanitarian service
- Lunch break
- Afternoon: Construction project / humanitarian service
- Evening: Mass followed by dinner
- Night: Night activity and prayers

2. ORGANIZING YOUR TRIP

Customs: Please be aware that Nicaragua customs charges a \$10 entry fee to get into the country.

Ground Transportation: Transportation is provided by a bus service.

Lodging:

- Fundacion Chinandega, a walled compound with 24 hour security. Accommodations are austere, however a bed and sheets are provided with multiple people per room.

Meals:

- Breakfast, lunch and dinner will be provided.
- Missionaries are advised to bring their own snacks (protein or power bars, granola bars, peanut butter, trail mix, almonds, dried fruit, etc.).
- Purified water will be provided throughout the week. Powdered Gatorade is always helpful to prevent dehydration.

Weather Conditions:

- Chinandega will be very hot during the day- upper 90s and very humid.
- At night it will get down into the low 70s or high 60s but can feel cooler depending on the ocean breezes.
- Missionaries should consider weather conditions when packing.

Medications:

- Due to the change in environment and types of food eaten or water, please bring medicine that can soothe stomach discomfort.
- There are no special vaccinations required, although all participants should be up-to-date on routine immunizations and tetanus shot.
- If you have any prescription medicines, please make sure you have enough for the trip.

Spiritual life:

Please keep in mind that a mission is primarily a spiritual event. Mission Youth seeks to bring its participants into a deeper relationship with Christ and to foster a love for his Church. Mission activities will include daily Mass, talks, access to the sacraments and spiritual direction.

Dress code:

- Due to the poverty where the mission is held, missionaries are expected to be simple and presentable in their clothing and manner.
- We ask that all Mission Youth participants respect our dress code: pants, or capris (many missionaries choose to use scrubs), Mission Youth t-shirt and closed-toed shoes.
- Mission uniform should be in a presentable condition throughout the course of the mission.
- Clothes to relax in at the end of the day are permitted, keeping in mind that missionaries are on mission during the entire trip.
- Missionaries should be aware that if a Mission Youth staff member asks them to change their clothing, they
 must comply. Missionaries might be asked to change for reasons of safety or cultural sensitivity.

Physical conditions to be aware of:



- Missionaries will be participating in humanitarian tasks according to the needs of each project. Tasks can include climbing a ladder, hammering nails, lifting concrete blocks, mixing cement, painting etc.
- Missionaries should expect mild to rigorous walking.
- Due to the nature of the mission environment, the mission schedule may experience unpredictable changes.
 Missionaries should be flexible.

Communication during the mission:

- There is limited phone and wifi coverage in Nicaragua; our staff has a local phone number for emergencies. We communicate this number to all missionaries prior to the trip.
- Family and friends will have the option to receive updates from Mission Youth.

Supplemental travel insurance policy:

- Mission Youth obtains supplemental accident/injury/illness insurance for each missionary (available for US citizens and permanent residents only) with proof of primary insurance provider information.

Mission Youth management standard:

All staff members and adults over 21 are required to undergo training and background checks if minors are participating on the trip.

3. MISSION STAFF AND OTHER ROLES

Everyone comes on the trip as a missionary. Here are some specific roles to be aware of:

- Mission Director: A designated member of the Mission Youth national staff that works with the Mission
 Coordinator to organize the mission. The Mission Director is responsible for hosting the group in the
 organizational daily activities, formation, projects, transportation, meals and lodging throughout the actual
 mission trip. The mission director is responsible for the mission leadership team and for the Missionaries.
- **Mission Coordinator:** The person in your local area who is organizing the mission and who will be participating in the actual mission trip.
- Chaplain: A Catholic priest who will accompany the group.
- **Customer service:** Please contact Anna Kulway for any questions about payments, background checks, administrative support (1-855-556-6872).

4. PACKING LIST

Necessary:

- Passport and photocopy in separate location
- 3 to 4 pairs of pants (see missionary dress code)
- 5-6 T-shirts or undershirts (tank tops, camisoles) to be worn under the missionary t-shirt
- Clothing for downtime at the end of the day
- Pajamas (can be cold at night, please bring extra blanket or covering)
- Hat or head covering to block the sun



- Closed toe shoes (for construction projects sneakers or construction shoes)
- Flip flops for the shower
- Hand sanitizer and/or antibacterial hand wipes
- Mosquito repellant and sunscreen
- Toiletries (Shampoo, soap, conditioner, toothbrush, toothpaste)
- One-piece swimsuit (for outing day)
- Towel
- Work gloves
- Snacks
- Water Bottle (you will receive a Mission Youth Water bottle, but it is always good to have another as a backup)

Optional:

- Extra spending money (Keep in mind that this is a third world country; you will not need excessive money for souvenirs)
- Rosary and other personal prayer items
- Laundry detergent to hand wash clothes
- Miraculous medals or other religious items to give away

Leave at Home:

- Alcohol, drugs, or cigarettes (see code of conduct)
- Electronics and valuables such as jewelry, watches, iPods, iPads, lap tops, etc.
- · Candy that will melt easily
- Hair dryers, flat irons, electric razors, other electrical apparatus (electricity is very limited)
